






Cost of living crisis is latest in line of recent shocks





Leaving incomes well down on where they could be





Prompting a rapid jump in charity demand


Number of people helped by CAB with referrals to foodbanks or other charitable support: England & Wales


Household debt servicing costs (interest payments as a share of household disposable income, rolling four quarter sum): UK


Number unemployed (16+, four-quarter moving average): UK



People want/expect charities to step up


Which, if any, of the following, do you think that charities should do to help support those affected by the current cost of living crisis? GB, Sep-22 (all that apply)

With sector income likely to fall in the next two years


PBE analysis of charity income (adjusted by CPI inflation) based on OBR and ONS data

Proportion of charities expecting a decrease/increase in demand and workforce and deterioration/improvement in financial position over the next three months: UK, Nov-22




Decrease/deteroriate


How have recruitment difficulties affected your organisation? UK, Nov-22 (among those who said they had experienced recruitment difficulties)


To what extent do you expect to be able to meet demand for your services over the next three months? UK, Nov-22

51% of charities reported using their reserves to meet day-today operating costs in February 2023

But overall, 2023 is turning out to be another tough year

- The pace at which living standards are falling has slowed, but we haven't yet shifted out of reverse
- Household debt, unemployment and the legacy of public service backlogs will further add to charity demand in 2023
- The cumulative effects of multiple economic shocks mean many charities are already beyond capacity and likely to struggle to meet demand
- Things *are* expected to improve over the course of the year, but outcomes will likely get worse before they get better
- In response, govt and funders should provide more resource, more understanding and more collaboration
