# Data visualisation

#### Flourish

Data visualisation tool that can create static graphs and charts as well as interactives and animations. Lots of templates to work with. <u>https://flourish.studio/</u>

#### Datawrapper

A quick tool for create visualisations for embedding onto websites. Used by journalists as well as organisations like the UN. <u>https://www.datawrapper.de/</u>

#### Our World in Data

### Infographics

#### Infographia

A downloadable set of 4500+ infographic templates for PowerPoint, Keynote or Google Slides. One-off payment required (no subscription needed). <u>https://infograpia.com/</u>

#### Infogram

A tool for creating infographics using an easy drag-and-drop interface. You can paste in data, upload spreadsheets, or connect it to live data sources. <u>https://infogram.com/</u>

#### Canva

A flexible, browser-based design tool with plenty of pre-built templates – as well as icons, charts and different text elements.

# Images and icons

#### Pexels

Large respository of photos (and video) that can be used for free, without attribution. Try and think laterally with your search terms to get the best images. <u>https://www.pexels.com/</u>

#### Pixabay

Huge store of photos, illustrations, vector images, and GIFs. You can use the images for commercial or non-commercial use, as long you're not selling them. <u>https://pixabay.com/</u>

#### Flaticon

A resource containing more than 12.4 million icons. You need to make your searches as specific as possible. Download the images as png files, and you will also get details of how to credit them.
